and in service to the poor.


In all of this, our family becomes a living expression of Your Church, a hallowed home of life and love.

Welcome Back!

Our program has grown to include programs for almost everyone in the parish . We have PREP for children ages 3-13 that are in preschool through 8th grade. SPRED for our children with special learning needs, RCIC for children in grades 3-6 that missed reception of Baptism, Reconciliation and Eucharist, HSPREP for our youth in grades 9-12, and RCIT for students in grades 9-12 that need sacramental preparation.

The mission of our program is to promote the faith, teach the word of God, in our parish and in our community. We will strive to help all to explore their Catholic faith, develop morally correct attitudes towards God, self and others as they grow in religious understanding and practice. Specifically, by our own example and commitment to our own formation, we will assist parents in their roles as primary educators of their children.

Our texts and materials help to enhance our mission. Our preschool will be using RCL Benzingerøs Stories of Godøs Love. We will continue to use W.H. Sadlierøs We Believe for children in Kindergarten through 6th grade, We Live Our Faith for our 7th & 8th graders; Inspired by the Spirit for our eighth grade confirmation program. A Year Through The Gospels—St. Mary's Press, for our High School program. For children with special learning needs we use the Rose Kennedy Program and adaptations from the Sadlier series..

The Faith Knowledge Standards developed by the Archdiocese of Washington are at the core of our teaching. These Standards are based on the 6 pillars of catechesis (pray, learn, celebrate, share choose and live). Although we use the term grade to represent each level of our program, our intent is to provide a complete catechesis. Therefore, each child is placed in what is deemed an appropriate level/grade with the expectation the he/she will participate from the beginning level to the end. It has happened in the past, where a child may attend for one or two years and drop out, only to return at õSacrament timeö. In this situation, the child will be placed at the level when he/she left our program.

Parents, we need your support in our mission. Please review this handbook for program policies, discuss with your child what is being taught in the classroom and most importantly, attend Mass together. Let us all pray for a fruitful year filled with learning and love for the Lord.

"God's love is communicated to infants and young children primarily through parents." Parents have shared the gift of human life with their children and, through Baptism, have enriched them with a share in God's own life. They have the duty to nourish it. Their faith, their attitude toward other human beings, and their trust in a loving God strongly influence the development of the child's faith. Parents are catechists precisely because they are parents. Their role in the formation of Christian values in their children is irreplaceable. They "should speak naturally and simply about God and their faith, as they do about other matters they want their children to understand and appreciate." (NDC, p. 202-203)

We are a team.

We cannot and should not replace you as the primary catechist of your child.

It is our role to support you in your efforts and we respectfully ask that you reciprocate.

We believe that with prayer, faithful Mass attendance, reception of the sacraments, service to others and study of the teachings of our faith we can all be the people that God has called us to be.

Knowledge Based Standards For Religious Education

In previous years, we used the Guidelines for Religious Education as the basis of our program instruction. These guidelines covered what each student should know by the end of each program year.

Beginning in 2012, the Archdiocese of Washington, implemented the new Faith Knowledge Standards. A CD of the entire Curriculum Guide was provided to each family and currently offered to any newly registered family. If you have misplaced your CD, a link can be found on our parish website. The new guidelines are:

Forming Disciples for the New Evangelization
Archdiocesan Religion
Curriculum Guide
Grades Pre-K to 8

This curriculum looks at the six tasks of catechesis as six key elements of lived Catholic life so as to help young disciples in formation to realize the intimate connection between our Catholic faith and life. These six key elements of Catholic life "constitute a unified whole by which catechesis seeks to achieve its objective: the formation of disciples of Jesus Christ." (GDC nos. 85-86; NDC no. 20)

As mentioned on page 5 of this handbook, knowledge based assessments will be administered annually to students in grades 3-8. Our students will take this assessment in the Spring. Please make sure your child is in attendance for the Assessment as there are no make-up days for this test.

Program Times

SPRED (Special Needs Religious Education) ó 1st, 2nd and 3rd Sundays from 9:25 AM to the end of 9:30 AM Mass.

PREP - (Preschoolô 8th Grade) 1st, 2nd and 3rd Sundays from 10:40 ó 11:50 AM (see calendar)

RCICô (Grades 3-6) 1st, 2nd and 3rd Sundays from 10:40 ó 11:50 AM

RCIT - (High School Sacrament Preparation Class) 1st, 2nd and 3rd Sundays from 10:40ô 11:50 AM

HSPREP - (High School Religious Education)1st, 2nd and 3rd Wednesdays from 6:30 ó 8:00 PM (Students may be excused to attend Mass)

Confirmation Preparationô 1st Wednesday of each month from 6:30ô 8:00 p.m.

Our program year runs from September through June to meet the Diocesan requirement of 30+ hours of instruction.

Please make your best effort to have your child here on time. It is very disruptive to have a child enter the classroom once instruction has begun! Excessive tardiness will be counted as an absence.

Dismissal Procedures

For the safety of our children, the following dismissal plan will be followed:

At the end of each session, students will be dismissed, as a group. Students in grade 2 and above will be allowed to leave the hall to wait in the designated area (weather permitting) (look for traffic cones). Please be reminded the no child from preschool through 1st grade will be released without an adult they will not be released to a non-adult sibling.

Cancellations or Delays

Classes will be canceled if PG County activities have been cancelled. If in doubt, notices of cancellation will be placed on the voicemail box of the Religious Education Office (301-249-1167). Any make up classes will be announced at the lectern during mass and may also appear in the church bulletin.

Service Projects

Over the years, we have offered several opportunities for the children to participate in service projects. While the projects may vary from year to year, some traditional ones include:

- Cemetery Clean-up
- Christmas Giving Program
- Lit For Little Ones
- So Others Might Eat (SOME)
- Various Charitable Collections

While these projects are not mandatory, we hope that you would encourage your child to participate to teach them a sense of stewardship of Godøs creation and to each other.

Internet Communication

Email is a wonderful tool for communication. On your childøs registration form, you were asked to provide an email address. Please be assured, that your email address will not be sold or given out to anyone. All group emails are sent via öblind copyö

Each week, on Mondays for HSPREP & Confirmation and on Thursdays for SPRED & PREP, you will receive reminder emails regarding the upcoming classes. Please check for reminders both in email and in the bulletin. This is a courtesy and not meant to replace the printed calendar.

You will not receive SPAM (cute stories, pictures, jokes, or political rhetoric) from my office. I ask that you also do not use this form of communication to send SPAM.

Confirmation

In the Archdiocese of Washington, it is recommended that confirmation be celebrated during the 7th-8th grade year. Here at Holy Family, we begin our preparation in January of the studentsø 7th grade year. Preparation concludes in June of the 8th grade year.

Our program has 7 Components:

- Faithful attendance at Sunday Mass (including 1 monthly class mass that all candidates should attend)
- 2. Faithful attendance of Confirmation Class (once-a-month on the 1st Wednesday of each month)
- 3. Regular communication and journaling with Sponsor
- 4. Completion of Community Service Projects
- 5. Attendance at a weekend retreat (held in spring of 2nd year)
- 6. Written letter to the Bishop requesting Confirmation
- 7. Interview with the pastor to determine readiness

Confirmation is a Rite not a Right. Readiness of the candidate determines its reception.

Students that are out of sequence should review the requirements on page 7 of this handbook.

Class work

Each student should come prepared for class with his/her textbook and binder. We will provide all other needed supplies. Each year, your childos binder will contain the program calendar, handbook and textbook. A CD containing the Archdiocesan Faith Knowledge Standards will be given to newly registered families each program year. A syllabus for each grade/level is also provided.

Unit Assessments and quizzes are part of the curriculum. For this program year, Unit Assessments will be taken in class. Students will be allowed to use their text and given 45 minutes to complete the test.

A Faith Knowledge Assessment will be given in the Spring to students in grades 3-8. A proficiency of at least 60% must be obtained to progress to the next grade/level.

Homework

Students may be given homework, this includes those students in Sacramental Preparation. Any uncompleted class work and homework should be completed and returned by the next session unless otherwise indicated.

Progress Reports

Progress reports will be given to students in grades 1-8. These reports will be distributed at least 3 times during the program year with a final report mailed home. Reports will indicate scores from Unit Assessments, Faith Knowledge Assessment (if applicable), Summer Packet Score and attendance records.

Home Study

You the parent, are the primary teacher of your child. If you would prefer to teach Religious Education at home, we have materials that you can purchase. This excludes those students preparing to receive Sacraments. These children should be part of or our Preparation Program per the <u>Liturgical Norms—Archdiocese of Washington (2010)</u>, para.17.1.

Summer Packets

An integral part in retaining the knowledge taught to the children is the completion of a Summer Packet. This packet is mandatory for children in grades 1-8 and part of the registration requirement. Packets can also be found on the parish website. Printed copies may be requested.

Child Protection

The Archdiocese of Washington (ADW), has implemented policies and procedures in an effort to protect our children. All of our adult volunteers, who work with children, are required to be in full compliance with the ADW policy. Volunteers undergo a background check that includes finger-printing and Child Abuse awareness training.

Students are educated, in an age appropriate manner, about ways to maintain their safety. Parents will be given a guidebook and an overview of the lesson material given to their child.

Children with Special Learning Needs

People of all abilities have a right to know the õmystery of faithö. However, we recognize that each person develops at differing rates. Some may also have special educational needs. These needs may include learning related or developmental related issues . We ask that you work with us, to help identify what they are so that we can do our best in bringing that person to God. Any information provided will be treated with respect and confidentiality.

Sacrament Preparation

It is Archdiocesan Policy that students receive Sacraments at their home parish. Preparation (catechesis) for the reception of these sacraments is also received at their home parish. Students attending a Catholic School should make arrangements to participate with our parish program for this preparation. Primarily, this affects those students in grades 2, 7 & 8. Please be aware of the following:

- 1. All parents of children preparing for sacraments are required to attend parent meetings. Review the calendar for time and place of meetings.
- 2. Parents of Catholic School students are asked to donate \$20 for supplies versus the \$80 registration fee.
- 3. Catholic School children will need to attend classes, as scheduled (see calendar). These classes will focus on knowledge of the sacraments, exploration and investigation of the specific sacrament and foster a sense of community.

Children who are out of Sequence

These are children who did not receive sacraments at the usually prescribed age. This is a 2 year program which aims at helping them become fully initiated Catholics.

Year 1 is an introductory year, exploring the Roman Catholic Faith, its traditions, practices and beliefs.

Year 2 focuses on the Sacraments and their reception.

<u>Students in grade 2</u> that have had no prior religious instruction will be enrolled in grade 1 and will meet during PREP.

<u>Students in grades 3-8</u> will meet during PREP. This is RCIC class. <u>Students in grades 9-12</u> will meet during PREP. This is RCIT class.

All participants are required to attend class each week, complete all homework assignments, attend Mass every Sunday and Holy Days of Obligation and complete any required service projects.
